After a cold and snowy winter we are looking forward to spring and the sun and warmer temperatures it will bring! It also will bring to the City the beginning of several projects that will make our City better!

One of the most visible projects we have scheduled for this summer is the M-53 Gateway project. This project includes the development of a 400 foot long boulevard in the center turn lane just north of the bridge on I-69. The boulevard will be lined with bricks and will have perennial plantings of flowers and grasses in the middle. A large metal sign with a brick base will welcome visitors to Imlay City. Decorative street lighting will be placed on both sides of M-53 from Newark Road south to the new boulevard. We hope this boulevard will slow traffic down and give visitors a great first impression of Imlay City.

We have another road resurfacing project scheduled for this summer as well. We will be milling and resurfacing East Capac Road (Old M-21) from M-53 east to the City limits. This will take care of the road in between the two recent paving projects on this road that were completed last Fall.

Finally, the City is in the planning stages for construction of a much needed new Fire Hall. The current old facility no longer meets our needs so the City is looking to build a new, modern Fire Hall. The City is looking to purchase the DNR property on Borland Road near M-53 which is an ideal location for the Fire Hall. The City is in the process of completing the purchase of the property and will be hiring H2A, an architectural firm, to design and manage construction of the project. If all goes well, the City anticipates breaking ground on construction sometime in August.

The City looks forward to another great Spring season and all the great weather it brings!

FROM THE DESK OF ED PRIEHS, DPW SUPERINTENDENT

With the arrival of spring comes spring clean-up. The DPW would like to remind residents of a few items that will assist with the clean-up. When raking a yard, please do not rake leaves or yard waste onto the street. Yard waste should be placed in marked yard waste containers or biodegradable bags. The garbage hauler will be picking up yard waste containers and bags on Tuesdays beginning in April to the end of November. The garbage hauler will also pick up bundled branches 1" or less in diameter. Bundles and yard waste containers cannot exceed 40lbs.

Also, beginning in April through the end of November the DPW will be chipping branches on the 1st and 3rd Monday of each month. The chipping will begin on the north side of the railroad tracks working to the south. If possible, the entire City will be chipped on Mondays. If the chipping is not completed on Mondays it will continue on Tuesdays. Please do not place brush directly onto the street so it does not cause an obstruction or hazard for drivers. Branches cannot exceed 4" in diameter and brush with roots attached cannot be chipped. The City is not responsible for large amounts of brush from tree trimming, tree removal, or clearing of property. Property owners should contact a tree service for excessive brush removal.

As with every spring, grass fires are more common, more than any other time of the year. Dead grasses are still standing and the new growth hasn't yet taken over the fields. The ground underneath may be soaked but the grasses and brush on top is dead and dry. As you get out and start cleaning your yards and gardens please be extra careful. As always you must obtain a burning permit before any open burning, permits can be easily obtained through the Imlay City web site (www.imlaycity.org).

🛐 <u>FROM THE DESK OF SCOTT PIKE, POLICE CHIEF</u> 🥻

As I sit here typing this I'm contemplating the events of this year, School Shootings, 21 Police Officers killed in the line of duty so far (as of February 23, 2018) and 4 Police K-9's killed. It is hard to hear these stories and wonder where our world is going, and should we be living in constant fear. As a 30-year police officer, I'm never surprised by violence but the increasing level and the growing number of victims causes me grave concerns.

What I would like to do is reassure the citizens of Imlay city, that the Imlay City School District and Law Enforcement (countywide) have been very pro-active in this area. While I will not give specific school plans for fear of tipping our hand to a possible attacker. Our schools are very secure and the staff is constantly evaluating and re-evaluating what steps may or should be taken.

Just a few personal safety tips in regards to acts of active violence, school, home, work or your everyday life. Make a plan, figure out ahead of time, don't wait for something to happen, it's too late then. If possible get

- formal training.
- Be aware of your surrounding (get your head out of your phone and your ear buds out). Constantly be looking for escape routes or hiding place.
- If you find yourself in an active violence situation, you only have three choices.
 - Run If it is safe, flee as far away from the incident as possible (call 911)
 - **Hide** If you can't escape look for a place to hide. Preferably someplace you can lock or barricade the entrance. Turn your cell phone to silent (Call 911.)
 - **Fight** If the attacker confronts you, you have no choice but to fight. Be creative use anything around you that can be used as a weapon (i.e. fire extinguisher, chairs, tools etc.)

My intent is not to make you more fearful but prepared. Lastly, the benefit of a small community is our familiarity with one another. If you notice someone or something suspicious or different. SAY SOMETHING. It is better to report and find no problem, than not too and allow an incident to occur.

FROM THE DESK OF PATRICK RANKIN, WASTEWATER SUPERINTENDENT

What happens when a wastewater plant receives more water than it is designed for? It occurs when during large rain falls and also when deep snow melts quickly. Sometimes plants just can't handle all the water as reported on the news. It is bad for the environment when such spills happen and operators do all they can to prevent this. Our Imlay City plant has an older ditch that we use as a retention basin. The tank is 486,000 gals so when the big flows come we divert part of the incoming water to that tank and that puts less pressure on our oxidation ditch to safely clean the water. After things get back to normal we slowly drain the saved water back to the head of the plant to be cleaned at a flow rate the plant can handle. Our plant averages 430,000 gals a day so when 1,000,000 gals decide to show up we have our work cut out for us.

FROM THE DESK OF JEANETTE FARLEY, POOL DIRECTOR
