# 2017 SUMMER NEWSLETTER



#### FROM THE DESK OF TOM YOUATT, CITY MANAGER

Now that a perfect Memorial Day weekend with excellent weather has come and gone, the official start of Summer is here!

The City continues to make progress on a variety of projects as we move forward into a busy Summer season. MDOT is about to begin a new road diet for the portion of M-53 from 1<sup>st</sup> Street north to Capac Road (Old M-21). The project will change this part of the M-53 corridor from the current 4 lane configuration to 3 lanes with a center turn lane. MDOT will be re-striping this section of M-53 soon for a 9 month trial basis. If successful, this will slow down traffic in this stretch and improve safety. The City will provide plenty of notice to our citizens prior to implementing this trial.

The City Commission is taking on a major planning effort for major projects under consideration over the next 5 years. Projects such as construction of a new Fire Hall, 4<sup>th</sup> Street Infrastructure replacement and continued improvements on M-53 will be studied. The City is working with Spicer Group, a City engineering firm, to assist in prioritizing these projects and looking at the most economical way to finance them.

The Parks and Recreation Commission recently began construction of a Butterfly Garden on West Third Street on a vacant lot owned by the City. Many plants attractive to Butterflies as well as a variety of wildflowers have been planted. A garden shed will be installed to house garden hoses and tools to maintain the garden.

The City has applied for a DEQ Scrap Tire grant to resurface Capac Road from North Almont Street east to M-53. If grant funding is received, the City hopes to mill and resurface this road this coming Fall.

Another project the City is looking to undertake is the lighting of the Polly Ann Trail in the City limits. If approved, the City would install about 20 decorative lights similar to those downtown and on North Almont Avenue. This would improve safety and encourage residents to use this great recreational trail.

Please check on the City's website and Facebook page for all of the upcoming summer events planned including our Farmers' Market (held on Thursdays and Saturdays), the annual Blueberry Festival, the annual Eastern Michigan State Fair and the Woods and Waters event. And don't forget to visit the City's Pool this summer to cool off during hot, sunny days. The City wishes everyone a safe and fun-filled Summer!



### FROM THE DESK OF SCOTT PIKE, POLICE CHIEF



<u>Let's talk parking tickets</u>, no single issue in law enforcement causes people's blood pressure to max out and go from calm to fire breathing angry in a second as much as coming out to your vehicle and seeing that dreaded evil device on your windshield "the parking ticket."

Let's start with the notion that the police enjoy issuing tickets (especially parking tickets). If you enjoy people calling you every name in the book, making disparaging remarks about your mother and generally wishing you the worst; then yeah we love that. Personally we would like to never issue another parking ticket our whole careers.

The reality is there are legitimate reasons for parking citations: safety issues (i.e. parked on the wrong side of the street - the front of your car does not have red reflectors making them hard to see, etc.); property damage issues (grass, curb, sprinkler damage, etc.); public nuisance issues (blocking someone's driveway, or across a sidewalk, etc.)

Some of the most common parking issues we write tickets for are, parking on the wrong side of the boulevard (the grass between the sidewalk and curb), parking on the wrong side of the street, blocking driveways, handicapped parking and the winter street parking. Then I'm constantly asked "where should I park then?" I can't answer that, it's something you must plan for and sometimes requires some walking.

Also be aware, parking a car in your yard is a zoning /blight violation and you will be cited for that as well.



# FROM THE DESK OF RICK HORTON, FIRE CHIEF



I believe summer has arrived. A lot is happening in the Imlay City Fire Department. Congratulations to our newest members, Clinton Thurlow and Eric Schwalbe for completing and passing all the requirements for FF1 and FF2 certification.

Along with the arrival of summer comes outside activities. There is a new City Ordinance that pertains to burning in the city limits, (Chapter 94 - Fire Prevention 94.01 Open Burning). Recreational fires are allowed with a permit, no larger than 3 ft. by 3 ft. contained within a metal fire ring or other self- contained metal units and does not create a public nuisance. No grass, leaves or garbage shall be burned.

The Imlay City Fire Department & Imlay City Police Department are asking business owners and/or business managers to fill out a key holder form (available at City Hall, Fire Department, and Police Department). These forms give the departments access to contact telephone numbers of employees with keys for that business in case of an emergency. There is a cover letter with the forms explaining the entire program. Thank you for your participation. Have a good and enjoyable summer, and be safe.



#### FROM THE DESK OF ED PRIEHS, DPW SUPERINTENDENT



Like most cities and villages, the City of Imlay City owns and operates a sanitary sewer collection system that takes waste from a home or business through a private sewer lead to a series of city sewer mains to a treatment plant where the waste is treated and released back into the environment. This process and its efficiency can be greatly affected by what residents and businesses put down the drain. Even though tree roots are a common problem most hear about in regards to sewer issues, there are two other major on-going issues that residents and businesses should be aware of and how it can affect the community. Expectations are that the toilet will flush 24 hours a day 365 days a year and this can be accomplished, but sewers are designed to dispose of only very specific things including: water, toilet paper, and human waste. The biggest issue effecting sewers locally is grease. A by-product of cooking, grease comes from meat fats, lard, oil, shortening, butter, margarine, food scraps, baking goods, sauces, and dairy products. When washed down the sink, grease sticks to the inside of sewer pipes (both in the property's sewer lead and the City's main). Over time, it can build up and block the entire pipe and the results can be raw sewage overflowing in your home, your neighbor's home or business, and many other issues including an increase in operation and maintenance costs for the sewer department. The second biggest issue effecting sewers locally is flushable wipes. Many items marketed as flushable generally are not accurate and flushable wipes do not degrade like toilet paper. If a "wet wipe" must be used rather than toilet paper, dispose of them in the garbage. Grease, flushable wipes, and cooking oil are waste that the City's sewer system cannot handle and should not be discarded down the drain. The City needs the help of all its residents and businesses to keep the sewer system running properly. Expensive sewer backups, plumbing emergencies, and increases in sewer maintenance and repairs can be avoided, while helping protect water quality in the community.

#### FROM THE DESK OF JEANETTE FARLEY, POOL DIRECTOR

The Alvin Norlin Swimming Pool is ready for summer! This year we have made some minor changes. We now have Saturday Morning Open Swim time from 10 am to 12 noon, and week day morning swims (also 10A.M. - 12P.M.) for the first half of July. Our afternoon Open Swim is from 1 pm to 5 pm every day, and evening Open Swim is from 7 pm to 9 pm every day. Water Aerobics is now from 6 pm to 7 pm on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

We have had to make some price increases. Afternoon open swims are now \$3.50 per person, evening and morning swims are \$2.50 per person, and water aerobics is \$2.00 per person (but senior citizens and children under 3 still enter for just \$1 per person). Our season Family Pass is now \$120.00, and the season Individual Pass is \$55.00. (Super Savers and swim lesson prices remain the same).

Swim Lessons are available for all ages. The morning lessons begin June 26 and evening lessons begin June 20. Detailed information can be picked up at the pool or at City Hall, or find it online at www.imlaycity.org, as well as on our Facebook page.

This is the perfect time to ensure that your voter registration is up-to-date. Contact City Clerk Nicole Frost at (810) 724-2135 to make sure your voter registration is active, especially if you have moved.

Michigan Law dictates that voter registrations may be cancelled if the clerk receives reliable information that a voter has moved and no response is received from the voter over the course of two, successive statewide November general elections.
