# City Manager, Tom Youatt

With Memorial Day weekend just behind us and with the start of the summer season, we are experiencing nice warm and mostly sunny weather! This will make up for the cool and windy Spring weather we recently had.

The City is very close to completing the new Fire Hall. We only have a few touch up items and the final coat of paving to do and we will be ready to move in and open. A ribbon cutting ceremony and an open house for the public to see our new facility will likely be held only after things open up with the coronavirus pandemic. The City will make sure to let everyone know when this will happen as our Imlay City Community strongly supported funding for this much needed project.

The City is also finishing up a small water main project on East Borland just east of the new Fire Hall. City residents have been paying taxes for years without City water. Installation of this new water main has been in the planning stages for a few years now and the total cost will be under \$ 100,000.

With the coronavirus pandemic, the State DNR is holding up on the City's \$ 150,000 Recreation Passport Grant for construction of the new Splashpad. Also, the City recently received only 1 bid for the project which was 20% higher than the budget. The City will likely re-advertise for bids in the coming weeks. The City has 2 years to build the Splashpad and the DNR funding will be secured for this project.

Also due to the coronavirus, the City Commission recently voted to postpone the Sesquicentennial until further notice and also, unfortunately, voted to close the City's pool for this summer.

The City will continue our successful street paving project this summer. Portions of West 6<sup>th</sup> Street, West 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, East 5<sup>th</sup> Street and South Main Street are scheduled for paving this year. This is the final year of our Street and Sidewalk Millage. The County Road Commission is considering a new road millage for the November ballot which if it passes, will bring street resurfacing funds to the City.


Finally, I have announced my retirement from the City effective June 30<sup>th</sup>. After 6 years here as City Manger and another 21 years in City Management and a total of 36 years in public service, I have decided to spend more time with my family. I want to thank everyone here in Imlay City who have been very supportive of the many projects we have accomplished together!

#### DPW Superintendent, Ed Priehs

The DPW would like to remind residents of a few items when performing yard clean-up this summer. Please do not rake leaves or yard waste onto the street. Yard waste should be placed in marked yard waste containers or biodegradable bags. The garbage hauler is picking up yard waste containers and bags currently until the end of November. The garbage hauler will also pick up bundled branches 1" or less in diameter. Bundles and yard waste containers cannot exceed 40lbs.

The DPW is currently chipping branches on the 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Monday of each month until the end of November. Chipping begins on the north side of the city working to the south. If possible, the entire city is chipped on Mondays depending on weather and work load. Please do not place brush directly onto the street as it can cause an obstruction or hazard to motorists. Branches cannot exceed 4" in diameter and brush with roots attached cannot be chipped. The City is not responsible for large amounts of brush from tree trimming, tree removal, or clearing of property. Property owners should contact a tree service for excessive brush removal.

Another example of why it important to not place obstructions onto streets is so streets can be swept regularly. Street sweeping is an important part of public works operations for other reasons than just appearance. Street sweeping removes litter, sand, loose gravel, soil, dust, vehicle debris and pollutants, de-icing chemicals, and other debris in order to prevent these materials from being washed into storm sewers. When done regularly, street sweeping can remove 50-90% of street pollutants that can enter surface water through storm sewers. It reduces catch basin and storm sewer maintenance, and will also make street surfaces less slippery in light rains. Residents can help by avoiding parking on streets during the day time or moving vehicles off the street when the street sweeper is in the neighborhood. Do not dump hazardous materials into catch basins, and please do not blow grass clippings or debris onto streets that could enter or block catch basins. With a combined effort, help protect surface water, minimize potential local flooding, and keep streets clean and safe.
